INFORMATION ABOUT DOG AS PUBLIC NUISANCE COMPLAINTS

 - North Dakota Rules of Civil Procedure;
 - North Dakota Rules of Court;
 - North Dakota Rules of Evidence;
 - North Dakota Administrative Rules and Orders;
 - Any local court rules.

This information applies to the following situation:

- 1. You want to file a complaint about a dog that is a public nuisance; and
- 2. You will file your complaint in a North Dakota State District Court.

Review <u>Section 42-03-01</u> of North Dakota Century Code Chapter 42-03 and decide if the dog meets the requirements for a public nuisance:

A dog is a public nuisance when that dog "habitually molests a person traveling peaceably on the public road or street."

Please note that the location of the incident(s) **must** be a public road or street.

Complete and file the "Dog as Public Nuisance Complaint":

If you decide the circumstances meet the requirements to file a dog as public nuisance complaint:

- **1.** Complete the attached "Dog as Public Nuisance Complaint." The complaint must include the following information:
 - Description of the dog.
 - Name of the dog, if known.
 - o If the name of the dog is not known, state this on the complaint.
 - Name and address of the dog's owner, if known.
 - o If the name of the dog's owner is not known, state this on the complaint.
 - Location of the incident(s).
 - o The location must be a public road or street.
 - Date(s) and circumstances of the incident(s) causing the complaint.
- 2. Sign the completed "Dog as Public Nuisance Complaint" in the presence of a notary public or clerk of court.

- **3.** File the completed, signed and notarized "Dog as Public Nuisance Complaint" with the clerk of district court.
- 4. Pay the \$10.00 filing fee.

The complaint will be filed as a civil case in the North Dakota State District Court:

The completed complaint will be filed as a civil case in the North Dakota State District Court. The Court will send a copy of the complaint to the dog's owner together with a notice that a complaint has been received and instructing the owner to take the necessary action to prevent the dog from creating a nuisance.

You will also receive a copy of the complaint and notice.

The Court will take no further enforcement action until and unless a second complaint is received concerning the dog's activities.

If the dog continues to constitute a public nuisance:

If the dog continues to constitute a public nuisance after the dog's owner has received the notice that a complaint was filed, you must complete and file a second "Dog as Public Nuisance Complaint" with the clerk of district court.

There is no additional fee for filing the second complaint.

After you file the **second** "Dog as Public Nuisance Complaint":

Upon receipt of a second "Dog as Public Nuisance Complaint," the District Court will schedule a hearing and issue a summons to the dog's owner requiring the owner to appear at the hearing.

You must also appear at the hearing and present evidence in support of the complaint.

The district judge will hear evidence in the case. If the judge finds that the dog is a public nuisance, the judge will order any peace officer to kill and bury the dog.

Costs:

The costs incurred in pursuing this matter will be paid by you, but if the dog is adjudged a nuisance, and the owner is known, judgment will be entered against the owner for the costs.

CHAPTER 42-03 DOGS AS PUBLIC NUISANCE

42-03-01. When dogs are a public nuisance.

Any dog that habitually molests a person traveling peaceably on the public road or street is a public nuisance. Upon written complaint to a district or municipal judge describing the dog, giving the name of the dog and the dog's owner if known, and, if not, so stating, and alleging that the dog is a public nuisance, the district or municipal judge shall give notice to the dog's owner that a complaint has been filed that the dog has been molesting certain persons and that the owner shall take the necessary action to prevent the dog from any further violations of this chapter. If the district or municipal judge receives a further complaint regarding the dog after notice has been given under this section, the judge shall issue a summons, if the owner is known, commanding the owner to appear before the judge in the same manner as other court summonses.

42-03-02. Owner of dog not known.

If it appears from the complaint that the owner is not known, ten days' notice shall be given by publication in one issue of a newspaper having wide circulation in the area. Such notice shall contain a description of the dog as given in the complaint, a statement that such complaint has been made, and the time and place of hearing thereon.

42-03-03. Hearing - Judgment - Execution.

On the day of hearing the district or municipal judge shall hear the evidence in the case. If the judge finds that the dog is a public nuisance, judgment must be entered accordingly, and the judge shall order any peace officer to kill and bury the dog, which order the peace officer shall forthwith execute.

42-03-04. Costs.

Costs shall be paid by the complainant, but if the dog is adjudged a nuisance, and the owner is known, judgment shall be entered against the owner for such costs.
